
#### Innovation

We believe that innovating is an important way to inspire people and



## **Our Program Areas**

Young Adult novel called "I'm Not Dying with You Tonight" and hosted a Diversity Equity & Inclusion (DEI) virtual book discussion with the authorts, Kimberly Jones and Gilly Segal. Additionally, this past fall, in collaboration with Sr4 Partners, we hosted a fourpart Diversity Equity & Inclusion training for area small business owners looking to incorporate DEI into their business model and workplace. Both programs were well received and we look forward to continuing to expand our DEI offerings in 2022.

## Advocacy

e serve as the voice of local businesses and protect our neighborhood's commercial interests by representing small business needs on important policy and development issues that impact our area.

In 2021, LRVCC worked tirelessly to ensure that our small business community survived the unprecedented COVID-19 crisis. We worked closely with the 32nd, 44th, and 47th ward offices to shore up their support for delivering a series of emergency measures to provide far-reaching and meaningful support to businesses in a couple of ways:

- Financial Relief to support businesses as we move towards recovery
- Overhaul of City Business
   Policies to reduce red tape and be more business-friendly

## **Our Program Areas**

the strength of our recovery depends upon the speed with which our local businesses can start up, expand, and provide quality jobs.

Additionally, in 2021, we participated in the Small Business Advocacy Council's Commercial Corridor Revitalization Coalition. As part of our work with the Coalition, we explored and formulated policy solutions laser-focused on reducing vacancies in commercial corridors. Because of this work, the coalition proposed legislation to ensure that property owners whose property taxes are reduced because of vacancy make legitimate attempts to sell, lease or improve their properties. This legislation is currently being considered in Springfield.

## **Public Space Enhancements**

e work to maintain clean, green, and welcoming sidewalks, and we develop new spaces that invite people to linger and connect with their community.

#### **Holiday Decor**

In 2021, SSA 27 lit up the neighborhood with a new style of holiday decor. Following a snowflake theme, this year's decor included decorating 130 poles throughout West Lakeview, a 25-foot community tree at the Lincoln Hub,






